Boudicca was queen of the Celtic Iceni tribe during the Roman invasion of Britain in 43 AD. The Celts believed that women could be strong leaders, and with her fearless attitude, wild hair and brutal battle skills, Boudicca was a brave and powerful leader who inspired **TERROR** in all who met her. The Roman army made a **MIGHTY** mistake when, simply because she was a woman, they underestimated Boudicca.

THE CHIEF POWHATAN

POCAHONTAS

Pocahontas was born around 1595 and was the daughter of the chief of the Powhatan Native American tribe who lived on the eastern coast of what is now Virginia, USA. The way Pocahontas and her people lived changed forever when ships from Britain arrived in **1606**. The people aboard (known as colonists) called America the **New World**. They wanted to farm the land and set up towns (or colonies) even though the Native Americans already lived there and had their own way of doing things.

The two sides traded with each other, but there was also a lot of misunderstanding and conflict. Pocahontas, who was just a young girl at the time, tried to make the best of the situation by offering help and friendship...

Even though I dressed like a COLONIST on my journey to England I was still considered VERY different.

1607: A colonist called John Smith was captured by Pocahontas's father. While being held prisoner Pocahontas taught him to speak the Algonquian language and he taught her to speak English.

The temporary PEACE my marriage brought was known as the POCAHONTAS PEACE.

1613: The relationship between the colonists and Native Americans got worse and even more fighting broke out. Because Pocahontas was the daughter of the chief she was captured!

Hold on! I was kind to you!

If we hold Pocahontas hostage, the chief will have to release the colonists he captured!

1614: While still being held captive Pocahontas married a colonist named John Rolfe. At the time women often had little say in who they married, so nobody can be sure exactly how Pocahontas felt about her new life. We do know that the marriage united both sides and brought peace (for a while at least).



In 1616 Pocahontas made the long journey to England with her husband – she was one of the first Native Americans to go there. John Rolfe returned to England to raise money for the colony and to show others what life was like in Jamestown. The people Pocahontas met (including the king) wrongly thought Native Americans were wild and dangerous, but they quickly realised that Pocahontas was none of those things.

Even when she was far from home, in what must have been a very daunting situation, Pocahontas helped to grow the understanding that all people, no matter their culture, deserve respect and kindness.

SHE PUT ON A DAZZLING SHOW FOR THE WORLD... JOSEPHINE BAKER

Josephine Baker was born in 1906 in St Louis, Missouri, USA. Her family were very poor and from a young age Josephine had to work to earn money.

When Josephine was growing up, black people were treated very unfairly. They weren't allowed to do the same things or go to the same places that white people could. This was called **segregation**.

To distract herself from life's problems, even just for a few moments, Josephine would do three things. Dance crazy new dances like the Turkey Trot, The Itch, and the Mess Around. Enjoy the thrill of laughter and applause. And pull funny faces!



"I improvised, CRAZED by the music... Each time I LEAPED I seemed to touch the sky!"

At just 14 years old Josephine landed a job with a group of travelling musicians. Audiences loved her and at 16 she was given a leading role in one of the first shows with an all-black cast to be shown on Broadway (the famous theatre district of New York).

Josephine was the talk of the town, but segregation meant that she would never be seen as an equal to white performers.

Josephine continued to wow audiences in the USA. One day she heard that there was no segregation in France. So in 1925, she took a job in a theatre in Paris...

Just like Josephine, Paris was dazzlingly different... oh la la...

Parisian audiences watched, mesmerised, as Josephine danced the Charleston (a popular dance of the time) like nobody had ever seen it before...

There was fascinating face pulling - magnifique!

Fast footwork - c'est fantastique!

And extreme body bending - sacré bleu!

Josephine was a star! She became so famous that hair styling products were sold for women who wanted to copy her distinctive look! Paris was a place that Josephine could truly be herself - dazzling, funny and rather eccentric. (Josephine owned a pet cheetah called Chiquita, that became part of her Parisian act.)

Josephine was so grateful to her adopted French home that during World War Two she put herself in danger by working as a spy for France.



MOTHER & DAUGHTER, UNAFRAID OF BEING OUTSPOKEN

Mother and daughter Mary Wollstonecraft and Mary Shelley both had a lot to say about what was wrong with the way people acted and treated each other. Their ideas were new and clever, but some people found them **SHOCKING** and downright **SCARY**.

Both women shared their ideas in books which are still read today, over two centuries later! Mary Shelley never knew her mother, as Mary Wollstonecraft died shortly after her daughter was born, but Mary Shelley was still hugely influenced by the ideas she read in her mother's books...

In 1792 Mary Wollstonecraft was the first person to publish a book suggesting that women's rights should be the same as men's.
