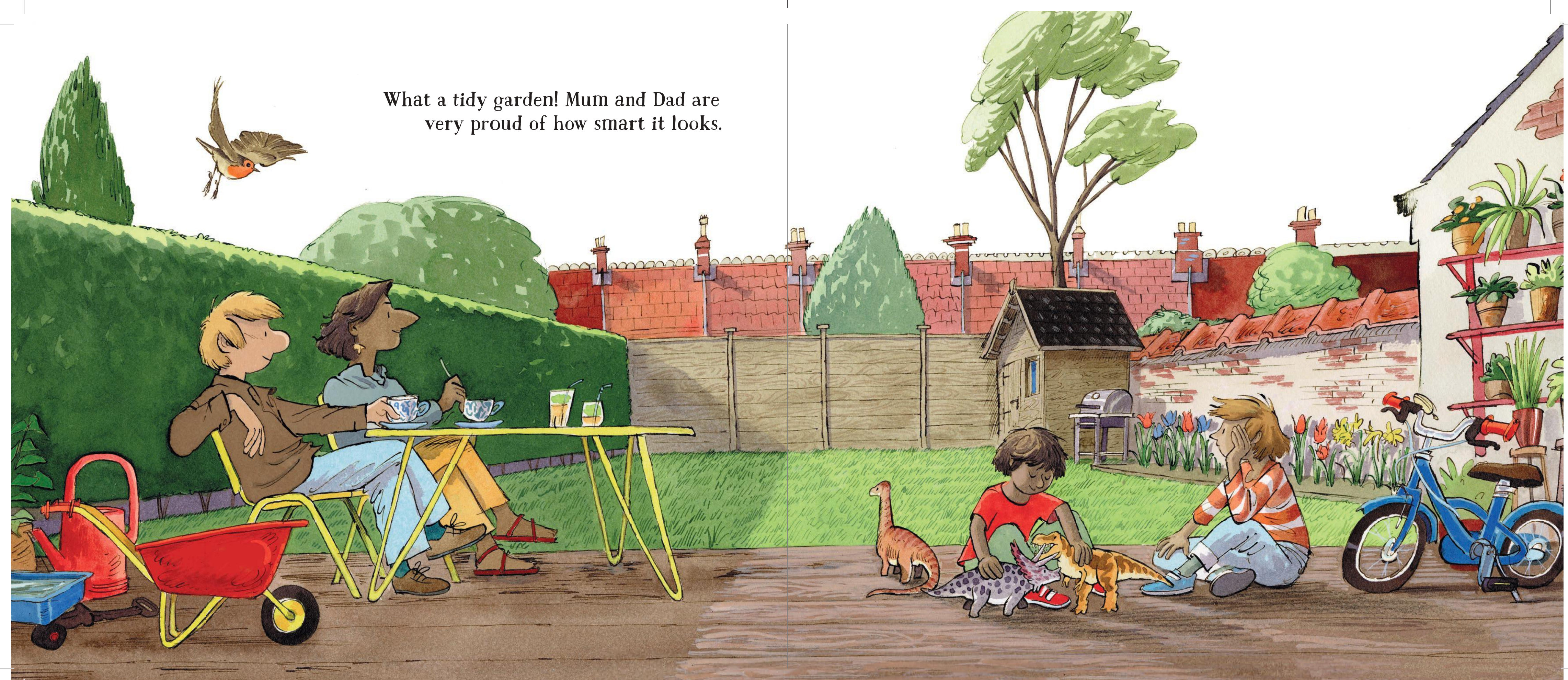

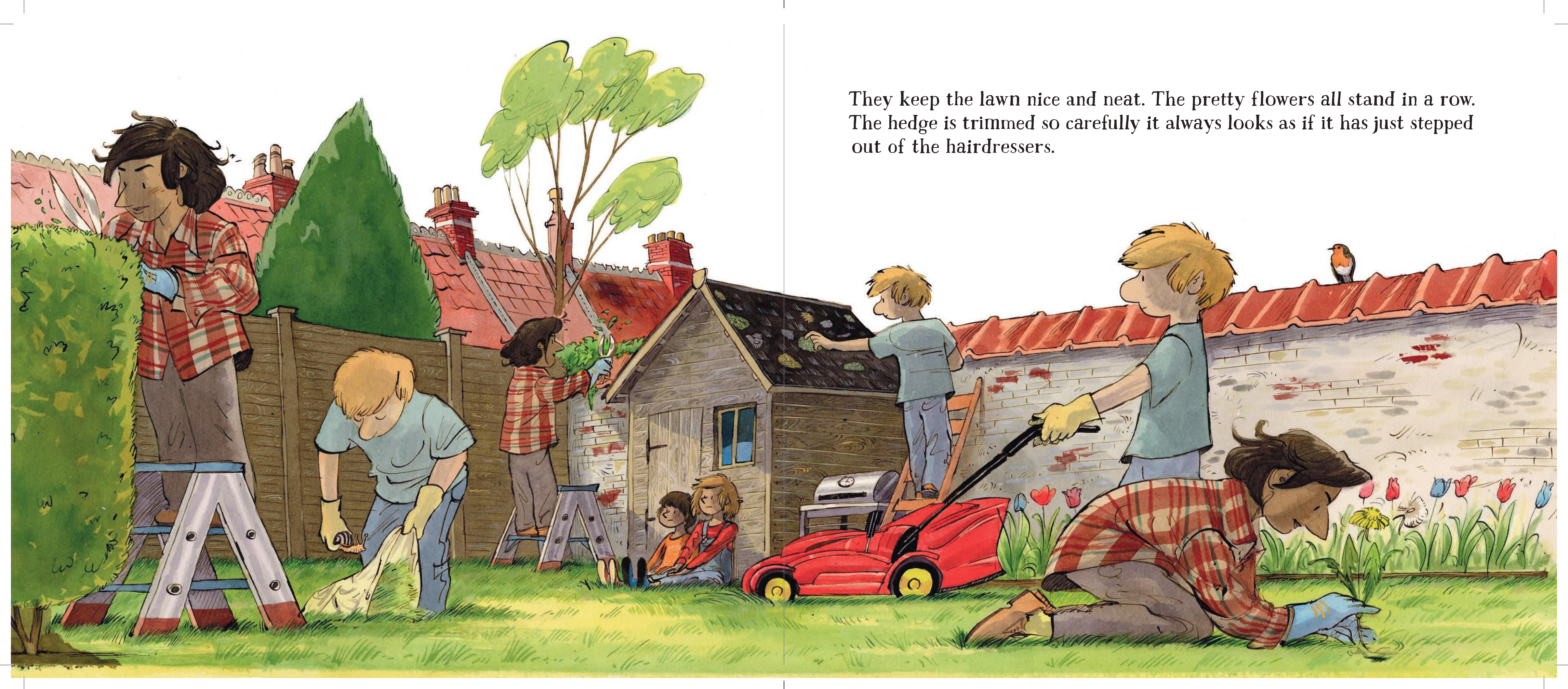


PUSHKIN CHILDREN'S

What a tidy garden! Mum and Dad are very proud of how smart it looks.



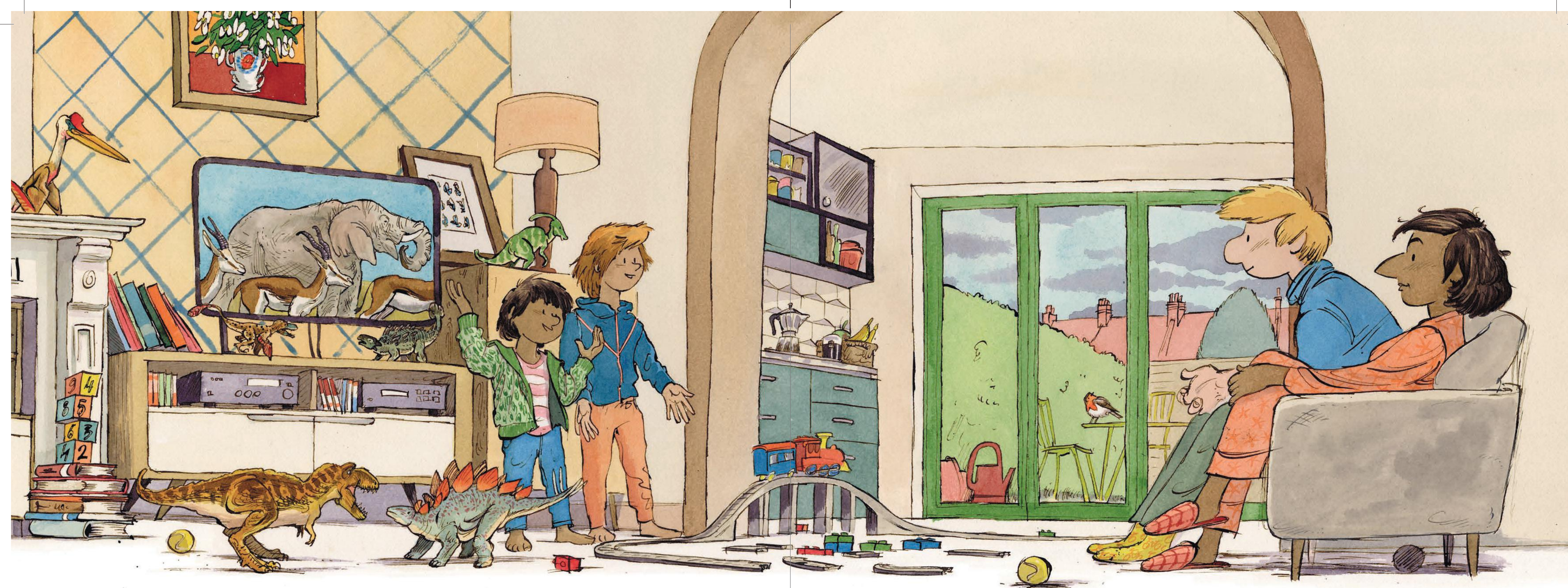
They keep the lawn nice and neat. The pretty flowers all stand in a row.

But one day Poppy and Ali hear about rewilding at school.

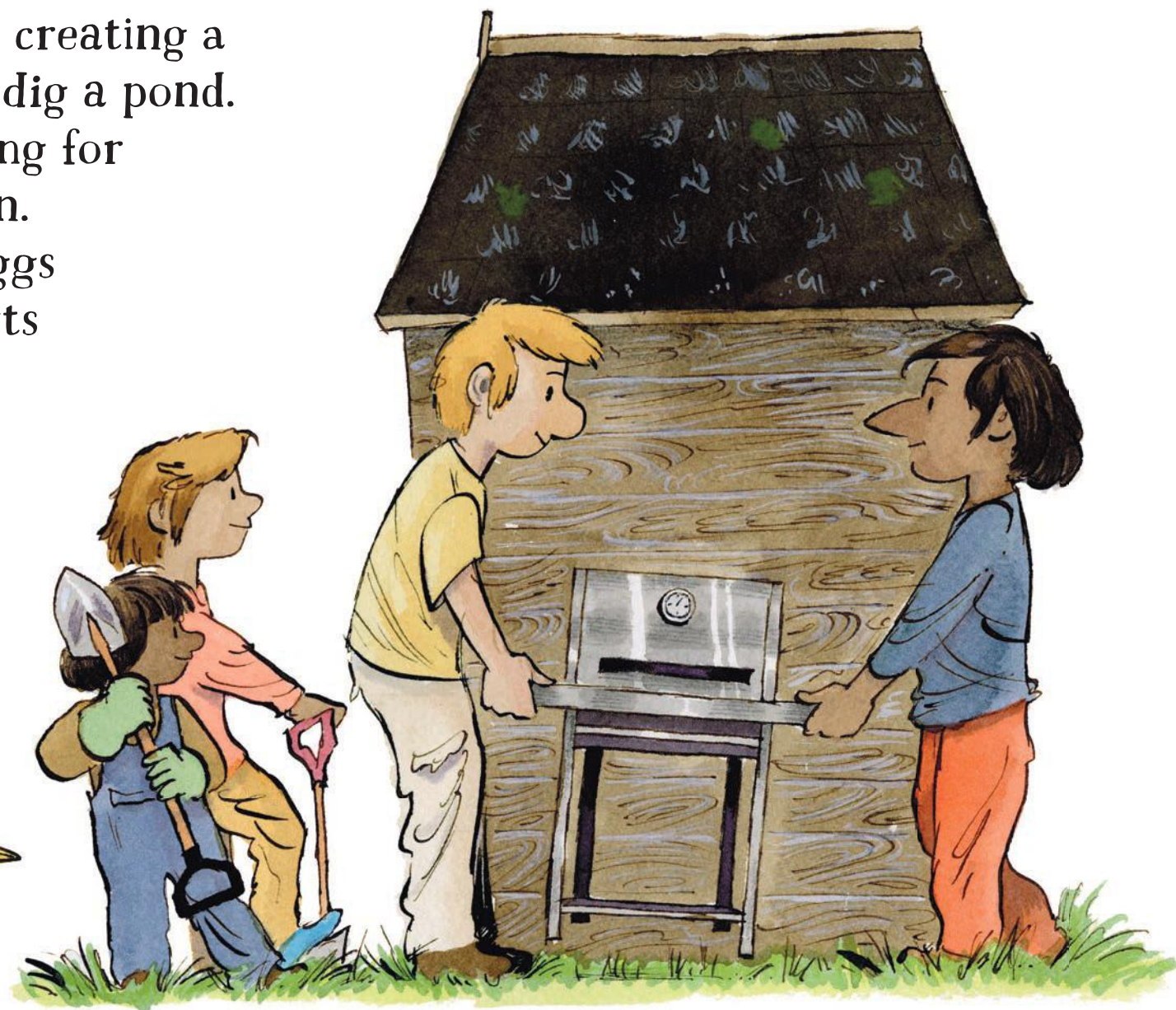
They start to dream about letting the wild into THEIR garden and all the adventures they could have.
